The Longburn Speed limit through all roads has been a problem for a while. Some of you may remember our school holding a mini protest out on the Main Road (by the dairy in Longburn) about a year ago. We protested to try and get lower speed limits on all roads in Longburn. We ended up in the Manawatu Standard which was good

publicity for our cause. We also put in a submission to the PNCC to try and get speed limits changed.

As you may have now realised, all the side roads in Longburn have

been changed to a 50 km/h speed limit which is great but the main highway speed through Longburn remains at 70 km/h. You may think why only the side roads? That's because the council is only in charge of the side roads. The Council was the only one who listened to our protest. The NZTA (New Zealand Transport Agency) is the group in charge of State Highway 56. Then you may think ...why didn't they change the Speed Limit? They said not enough people had died or been injured on the Highway to

change the Speed Limit. But even if only one person dies or gets injured it affects a lot of people. The Year 5 and 6's of Room 4 are thinking of ways to resolve this Issue. Some of them are: Sign a Petition, Set an Example ourselves (eg. Go slower), talk to the council or LCC (Longburn Community Committee) . But if you, the reader of this Article, have any Ideas to solve this Issue then contact the ROOM 4 Year 5 and 6's via the school office. Hopefully soon all the Roads in Longburn will be restricted to 50 km/h.

Abby's Powhiri Experience


We recently interviewed Abby, a year 3 student who started at Longburn School at the beginning of this year, about her experience in her first Powhiri.



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
